These recruiting stations will be opened in each town and city in the United States that has a large Polish population. Through their patriotic work 50,000 men have been sent to France and many of them are today in the trenches fighting for democracy and the overthrow of militarism as represented by the enemy.


A big street parade will be held Sunday afternoon at 3 o'clock in celebration of the opening of the recruiting station here. Societies from South River, Sayreville, Perth Amboy, New Brunswick and other places will participate.

All Polish men who enlist will be sent to Camp Niagara, Canada, where their training station is located. It is understood that Sergeant Lempe can compel any Polish man of legal age who has been placed in class 5 by the local registration board, to join the Polish army.

Several months ago Dr. Alexander Kamoski was arrested on Main street for wearing the uniform of a French officer. He was taken in custody by officers sent out by the Sayreville registration board on an order that had been issued by the army department.
