A certification of last Tuesday's election was read by City Clerk McLaughlin which showed the first-choice voters' preference for the majority as follows:

Mayor Morrison, 5,764; Commissioner Houghton, 5,439; Commissioner Jackson, 5,271; Commissioner Feaster, 4,975; and Commissioner Connolly, 4,849.

Many congratulations were received in banks of flowers which were placed around the room and in cards and letters. Following the meeting, the members of the board posed for flashlight pictures.

British Yacht Sinks With \$25,000 Cargo of Liquor on Board

NEW YORK, May 15.—Customs authorities today were advised that the prohibition enforcement agents guarding the coast against rum runners would have been alerted by the sinking of the British yacht Zeppa-Pheobe, laden with nearly \$25,000 worth of liquor, had sunk shortly after putting out from the Bahamas. Her entire cargo was lost and one or two of the crew were drowned the report said.
