CARRANZA MAY YET FREE PRISONERS

Still a Chance to Avoid Warfare if He Will Disavow Attack—No Word Yet Received in Reply to Ultimatum—Diplomats Are Hopeful.

WASHINGTON, June 28.—A hint that Carranza might, at the eleventh hour, reverse his decision not to release the American troopers held prisoners in Chihuahua City was voiced today by Postmaster General Burleson.

Simultaneously, the Latin American diplomats here renewed their pressure on Carranza to meet the wishes of the United States and prevent war.
