### Government Urges Stocking of Coal As Strike Likely

WASHINGTON, Jan. 23.—Secretary Hoover announced today that the government had been advising the stocking of coal in preparation of a possible strike on April 1, and that the Interstate Commerce Commission had sent letters to industries and public utilities corporations advising them to take the same step.

### Webber Again Held For Liquor Sale

### Du Bois Leaves Estate to Wife

Du Bois, the executors named being: Fred J. Cox, E. H. Boynton and C. D. Boynton.

### Hill Out on Bail in Wood Alcohol Sale

Horace Hill of Raritan township, who is charged with atrocious assault and battery on Raymond Hickey of Oak Tree because of an alleged sale of whiskey containing wood alcohol, was released on bail Saturday night by Justice of the Peace W. S. S. S. He furnished bonds of \$1,000, retained by the county, and his release was ordered, but he is now on the road to recovery.

### Perth Amboy Man Placed on Trial

### ALL HANDS ASKING, WILL STATE SENATE STAND FOR NUGENT?

### PETITION IN BANKRUPTCY

### GERMAN CHEMISTS AIDING BOOTLEGGERS

WASHINGTON, January 23.—Prohibition authorities are on the trail of two German chemists alleged to be working with a bootlegging organization in New York relative to nullifying the poisonous character of denatured alcohol. The bootleggers have been engaged in the treatment of denatured alcohol and brought the German chemists here, it is said.

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PORT WASHINGTON, N. Y., January 23.—Two children were burned to death early today in a fire which destroyed five business buildings on Main street. Five families living in the burned buildings were driven into the street in their night clothes. A frozen hydrant delayed firemen until the flames, which broke out on the east side of the street, reached the west side and attacked a hardware store. All the buildings were of two stories and frame construction.
