Keane and Thomas Bartkowiak of South Amboy Lose Lives as Car Slips on Ice — Three Others Seriously Injured.

AMBOY, Jan. 23.—John J. Keane, 22, son of 226 George Street, and Thomas Bartkowiak, thirty, son of John J. Dwyer of 250 Davis Street and Anton Miller of Marion Street, Perth Amboy, lost their lives here seriously as a result of an automobile accident near Rahway Sunday morning.

Keane and Thomas Bartkowiak were in a Peerless enclosed car, driven by Mr. Miller, was returning from a business trip, when he approached a curve on the highway near the garage of brothers on Central Avenue.

Mr. Keane, who was driving, lost control of the car and began to skid.

He applied his brakes with too much force, skidded, and the car, skidding, swerved sideways and making a complete circle, brought up head-on against the bank of a twenty-foot embankment near a stone bridge.

Keane and Bartkowiak were thrown from the car. Keane struck the tree and was impaled. Bartkowiak landed on a ditch close by and his neck was broken by the fall, he also lost his life.

The others in the car were thrown from the car. They were shaken up, but were able to return to their homes.

Keane sustained three broken ribs, a wrist and lacerations about the eyes. The other two men were cut and may have internal injuries.
