C. Pardee Works Sued For Factory Water Rates

Suit has been started by Tarrant F. King, Caroline King and Ann P. King, trustees of all of Perth Amboy, in a Supreme Court action here against the C. Pardee Works of Perth Amboy for rent and other charges on a building in Boston.

The plaintiffs claim that they own a building there known as King's Terminal, and that this was leased by the Grueby Balance and Tile Company of Boston under an agreement to pay water rates as well as rent. On August 1, 1920, they alleged, the Perth Amboy firm bought out the other corporation and took over its lease, but has since refused to pay water rates, and there is a balance of \$1,222.25 for rent and water charges still due.

He is a high school and normal school graduate, also a graduate of the school of administration of Harvard University.

During his administration at Sussex he added two courses, English and commercial, also three departments, music, drawing and manual training, having under him an excellent corps of teachers.

The teaching staff, together with the Board of Education and the community at large was very reluctant to have him leave. For two years he was Sussex County club leader of the boys' and girls' extension work, connected with the State College and played a very active part in church and civic affairs, being allied in an official capacity with the Methodist Church and community movements.

Wife Loses Fight For Slayer-Husband

TRENTON, Aug. 22.—Having exhausted every legal effort to save her husband, Mrs. Brandon, alias "Harold V. Lambie," charged with murder from the electric chair, Mrs. Jeanette Brandon, wife of the convicted slayer, has been compelled to abandon all hope. Her husband is to be electrocuted this week for the murder of Edith Janny and Arthur L. Kupper about two years ago near Rahway.

The wife's last ray of hope was shattered Saturday following the refusal of Justices Brandels and Holmes of the United States supreme court to grant a writ of error in the case when Governor Edwards declined to intercede in Brandon's behalf.

Held on Girl's Claim He Told Her License Was Equal to Marriage

Paul Kupecky of this city was committed to the county jail today by Justice of the Peace Morris Katz to be held for the grand jury on serious charges made by Josephine Cherkansky, also of New Brunswick, who claims that Kupecky promised to marry her.

According to the story told by the girl, who says she is only fifteen years old, after Kupecky had promised to marry her he induced her to tell the City Clerk that she was eighteen in order to get a license. After they had procured one, she said, Kupecky made her believe that the granting of the license was equivalent to marriage.

Joseph Zukiewicz of South River was committed to the county jail on a charge of deserting his wife, Iwa Zukiewicz, and failing to support her. He was held by Justice of the Peace John Ledwon.

Cranbury Man Caught in Jersey City Raid

Missing a train that was to bear him to his home in Cranbury on Saturday night, Michael Killen fell into the clutches of the police of Jersey City and had to spend the night in jail. He was arrested at the home of John Dunbrowska with five other men and women.

When the police entered the Dunbrowska home with a warrant for the arrest of Pauline Dunbrowska, as a habitual drunkard, he found the six occupants in a state of drunken revelry in the presence of seven children, all of them under twelve years of age.

The occupants, including Killen, were taken to police headquarters and Mr. and Mrs. Dunbrowska held under bail for the action of the grand jury. Killen was released following a hearing during which he told of having missed a train for his home.

Perth Amboy Falls From Dock and Drowns

Joseph Dudeck of 359 Prospect street, Perth Amboy, was drowned yesterday afternoon when he fell off the city dock there. Dudeck, in company with Klimarn Molopolski of 194 Grant street, Perth Amboy, was skylarking on the dock when the accident happened.
