

NEW WATER RATES ARE ANNOUNCED AT MILLTOWN MEETING

MILLTOWN, Aug. 13.—An ordinance was passed on the first reading at the meeting of the Borough Council meeting last evening. The new water rates will be fifty cents per thousand gallons consumed with a minimum charge of \$3.00 per quarter to take effect on September 1st.

Addition of Two Election Polls in South River Discussed at Meeting

GARDEN CLUB OF METUCHEN WILL MEET TOMORROW

SOUTH RIVER, Aug. 13.—Acting Mayor Bissett and the council are in favor of changing the boundaries of the borough's five polling places to include one or two more polls because there are over 700 voters registered in district two and 500 in district three.

(Note—The story of the action taken by the council on the request for bus permits by the Public Service will be found on page one.)

The members of the election board of district 2, including Mrs. Mary Cannon, John Armstrong and Mrs. Luella Letts, accompanied by Mrs. Hannah Franden, president of the Hoover Unity Republican Club, called the council's attention to the absolute need of more polling places as so as to reduce the number of voters in poll 2 and 3. They spoke particularly for poll 2. At the last election the board was detained until 6 a. m. the next day to complete the count. It was made out of the council's mind.

Attorney Burton claimed that no change can be made in polling districts between March 1 and the general election in November. It was the opinion of the councilmen, however, that more polling places are needed in order to expedite the counting of the ballots at both the primary and the general election. Acting Mayor Bissett promised that the request of the election board would be complied with after the general election in November. Attorney George L. Burton was advised to take whatever legal steps are necessary in order to have the matter in hand after November 5.

Carnival Plans Made

Preparations are practically completed for the St. Francis Church Carnival to be held tomorrow night and succeeding nights up to and including Saturday. All the regular amusements will be presented, and candies, novelties, and refreshments will be available.

A special attraction for the carnival is the record of the first annual flower show to be held by the State Federation of Women's Clubs, with which the Metuchen League is affiliated. Residents of the third district, in which Metuchen is included, will exhibit their entries at Belmar on September 24.

Will Buy Property

The council decided to pay \$1700 for the Martin Wessel lot on Hook side, the proposed site of a foot bridge over the Raritan River railroad tracks, connecting Roosevelt street with the avenue, a short cut to the Campbell School on David street. The council ordered \$1500 for the lot but the owner held out for \$1700. Attorney Burton claimed that condemnation proceedings would cost over \$300. If that course was pursued in order to take possession of the lot, the price asked by the owner, it was the opinion of Councilman Wood and others that the price was a trifle high.

The council reported that the council is now using part of the lot as an outlet for storm water. A great deal of damage has been done by the water spreading over one end of the property.

Adopt Ordinances

An ordinance for the vacating of a section of George street between John and Virginia, was adopted on its final reading to take effect immediately. The strip of land in question was donated to the borough by the John Whitehead estate by the time that Glenwood Terrace was being considered a few years ago as a site for a new school. As the deed strip was not accepted, the deed strip was not accepted, the deed strip would form a contiguous part.

An ordinance to include James and Alligar streets in this year's paving program was adopted on its final reading. Alligar street will be paved the entire length while James street will be paved between Hillside avenue and Johnson Place.

Will Interview Collector Nuss

The members of the finance committee were directed to interview Collector Nuss in reference to his returning to his office as borough collector, having been granted a leave of absence last spring on account of illness. It was reported that Collector Nuss is feeling better and comes to South River every week from Manasquan to look over the financial accounts of the borough. During his absence, ex-mayor William A. Alligar has been serving as Acting Collector. Both Mr. Nuss and Mr. Alligar have been drawing a salary according to the council's report. It was the opinion of the councilmen that in case it is necessary to extend Mr. Nuss's term of absence that his salary will be discontinued. It was reported that when Mr. Nuss was granted a leave of absence from his office it was with the thought in mind that it would be for a few weeks only.

The finance committee was instructed to have a report at the next meeting as to the borough's financial status in all departments, affecting all appropriations.

Account Not Large Enough

Councilman Fitzpatrick, chairman of the road committee, reported that the road account is never large enough to do the work that should be done annually on the streets. We always run short as we have this year. The chairman called attention to some of the work that could not be done on account of a shortage in the appropriation. Part of this shortage is due to the fact that the council assumed half of the expense of controlling the flow of storm water on David street, Theresa Place and Johnson Place by building collecting drains near the Campbell School.

Needs Traffic Signal

It was the consensus of opinion of the councilmen that some signal should be installed at the intersection of Reid, Prospect and Thomas streets, in order to control traffic when the clay cars of the South River Brick Company are passing. A stop sign was not considered the right thing. A flashing caution signal was thought the best. It was also suggested by the company that a system be installed that will flash a red light and remain on while the clay cars are approaching and leaving the intersection. The matter will be given more consideration as the corner is considered a dangerous one.

Transportation Question Discussed For Two Hours By Sayreville Council

SAYREVILLE, Aug. 13.—The common council at an adjourned meeting last night took up matters pertaining to transportation, and a discussion ensued which lasted nearly two hours.

Several months ago Paul Balkowski, a bus owner of South River, made application through the superintendent of the Hercules Powder Company to operate buses to the Hercules plant, and in the meantime applications were made by the Public Service, Joseph Barra and Joseph Byers.

Councilman Henry Boehm, chairman of the transportation committee, said that he thinks the first to make application should be considered. He said that the assistant superintendent of the Hercules plant said that they want service regardless of who gives it, and that one time under Mr. Nixon at the Hercules plant the Public Service was asked to run a tripper to the plant and no action was taken.

Mr. Creamer, a representative of the Public Service, said that they furnish service whenever it is required, and said that the reason for wanting the service is to expand their business. He also made a number of other remarks relative to the application.

Councilman Boehm, in answer to Mr. Creamer's remarks, said that it isn't what the Public Service will do or can do, and said they hadn't made a request until someone else decided to go in there. Every time Sayreville asked for anything it was necessary to go to the firing line with the Public Service to get it, said Councilman Boehm.

John Chemeski, another representative of the Public Service Transportation Company, said that the Hercules plant is the superintendent of the Hercules Powder Company and they decided to try out the service in the morning and afternoon. He said that they picked up two passengers on the 8:15 o'clock shift on the first shift in the morning two to six passengers, and on the 7:20 shift six to twelve, and that they were satisfied with what was being done. He said that if there is any service required at night, they will gladly put it on.

After a lengthy discussion a resolution was adopted granting Paul Balkowski a permit to operate two buses between Perth Amboy, South River, to the Hercules plant, and to pick up passengers in the borough to the plant and from the plant to the borough, the fare to be five cents within the borough limits. All the councilmen voted in favor.

Several applications were made to operate buses to the Terra Cotta plant in Old Bridge. Councilman Boehm said that he was in communication with Mr. Ryan, the superintendent, and that he was satisfied with the service given by Thomas Stillmoor, providing that he comes up to the plant road.

Mr. Stillmoor was present at the meeting and said that he has been going to the road for the past year, and has been operating a bus to the Old Bridge section for nine years. A motion was made that the other applications be dismissed and the clerk notify the applicants that the service to that section is adequate at this time.

James Keegan reported that the Public Service is operating buses on the Perth Amboy-South River route unlawfully by taking on and discharging passengers in the borough of Sayreville. This is a violation of the Public Utility ruling, he said. A resolution was adopted that a complaint be made to the Public Utility Commission relative to the violation of their ruling.

The matter of the application to operate buses between Old Bridge and South Amboy was laid over until the next meeting.

The chairman of the public buildings and grounds committee was authorized to go ahead and have an apron laid in front of the new garage in the rear of the borough hall. The water and sewer committee was authorized to arrange for the purchase and financing of a pump to be used in the Washington road pumping station. The question of purchasing meters was laid over until the next meeting. Mayor Dolan presided at last night's meeting, and all councilmen were present.
