New Jersey Jews at Meet at Perth Amboy

A meeting of New Jersey Jews has been called for Sunday evening, February 6, at 8 P. M., in the High

School auditorium at Perth Amboy, to promote the sale of stock for the Palestine Industrial Development Company. Judge Mack, president of the Zionist Organization of America, and Leon Zolotoff, editor of Des Yiddische Folk, will speak.
Adolph M. Meisendorfer, President of the Palestine, to investigate means whereby this \$500,000 building loan corporation may begin work. The company, which was recently organized in New Jersey, has already sold more than \$110,000 worth of stock, and Mr. Meisendorfer goes to open an office in Palestine to lend money to Palestinians on an easy monthly payment plan, so that they may build houses to relieve the acute emergency.

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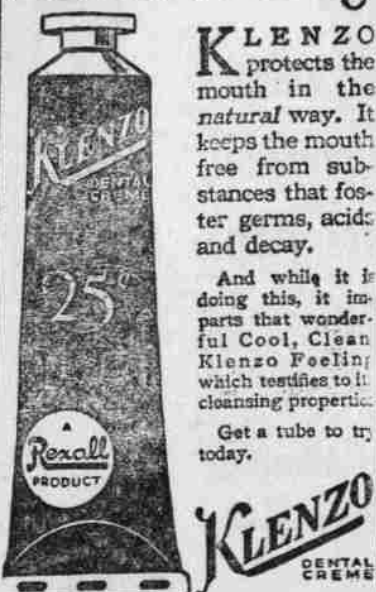
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
