

TRENTON, April 5.—After eliminating items aggregating \$5,500 in the general and supplemental appropriations bills, passed by the last legislature, Governor Fleider yesterday signed these measures, and they are now laws. The total amount of state money appropriated in these two bills is about \$7,500,000. In the supplemental bill, the governor vetocd an item of \$500 for Gardner Cody, secretary and chief examin-

ner Cody, secretary and chief examin-er of the New Jersey civil service com-mission for additional services during mission for additional services during the last year in connection with the conduct of civil service examinations for election officers. In the same bill the governor vetoed \$2000, appropriated to derfay the expense of a commission authorized by the legislature to codify the road laws of the

The governor vetoed this, because the governor vetoed this, because he believed that a similar commission of last year did nothing but play politics under the leadership of Sana-tor Gaunt, of Gloucester county. As a result of the commission's work last year, the Gaunt road bills were intro-duced in the last legislature, and they April 5.—Governor duced in the last legislature, and they without his approval, exempting farmhands bill, an item of \$3,000 also for codification of the road laws, was killed.
