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## FACES MRS. BOYLE

Little Willie Whitla Identifies Woman in Court.

NO DEFENSE PUT IN FOR HER.

Counsel Denies Jurisdiction of Court. "I Will Die Rather Than Go to Penitentiary," Declares the Prisoner.

Mercer, Pa., May 8.—Little Willie Whitla, the eight-year-old boy who was kidnapped from Sharon, Pa., and held a prisoner for \$10,000 ransom, went on the stand in court here at the trial of Mrs. Helen McDermott Boyle and identified her as his custodian for five days in the house in Cleveland, where she was known to him as "Mrs. Jones."

Willie Whitla told the story of his kidnapping as he told the same facts against Boyle, until he began to detail his arrival in Cleveland, where he first saw Helen Boyle.

"Whom did you meet when you got to the hospital?" asked Attorney Cochran. Boyle had told the boy that the apartment they entered was a hospital.

"We met Mrs. Jones," said the boy. "Do you see her in the room?"

"Yes. There she is," and the lad pointed to Helen Boyle.

"What did she say to you?"

"She said she had had her supper and for us to eat."

"How was she dressed?"

"She wore a white thing like a cap on her head and a long apron."

"How long were you in the rooms?"

"From Thursday until Monday."

Mrs. Boyle held her nerve throughout this and smiled contemptuously. She wore a veil that hid the slightly worn expression that weeks in prison have given her and gave her undeniable good looks their best chance. She glanced frequently at the youthful jurors.

James H. Boyle, who has been convicted of the kidnapping and awaits sentence, then went on the stand. He admitted that he had something to do with stealing the boy, but insisted that he did not plan the crime and that three others were in the plot.

One of these, he said, was a man who lived in Mercer county and who planned the kidnapping. This man was to get one-half of the ransom money. His wife, he declared, had nothing to do with the plot.

"Have you the letters which were sent to Mr. Whitla demanding ransom and which he returned to you when he paid the \$10,000?" asked Attorney Cochran.

"I had them," replied Boyle, "but I haven't them now."

One of the Cleveland policemen who took part in the arrest testified that Mrs. Boyle said, "I am the frail little woman who planned the whole thing."

The finding of the ransom money secreted in her clothing was also testified to.

The proprietor of the Granger apartments in Cleveland identified Mrs. Boyle as one of the couple who rented an apartment from her under the name of Walters.

With this the prosecution rested. Relying upon their contention that the Pennsylvania courts have no jurisdiction in her case, counsel for Mrs. James Boyle refused to offer any evidence in her behalf.

Mrs. Boyle said later to the reporters: "Both Jimmie and myself have tried to tell the whole story in connection with this case. We have not been permitted to do so. It is not justice. Everything should be heard and thrashed out. As for myself, I will commit suicide before I go to the penitentiary."

Justice Garretson will charge the jury on Tuesday morning, and thereafter the fate of Captain Hains will be in the hands of the jury.

The proceedings ended abruptly at the conclusion of the cross examination of the state's last alienist, Dr. George V. Foster. He declared that Hains was now sane and that his acts prior to the shooting of Annis indicated sanity.
